## Urtak Poll

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Abstract

A snapshot of the Urtak Poll, "Cooper Union – Have Your Say", taken on December 10, 2011, sorted by subject, without all of the clicking.

On October 31, 2011, an Urtak Poll was set up <https://urtak.com/u/10224> called, "Cooper Union – Have Your Say", with 19 questions for the Cooper Union Community. Users could suggest additional questions to a moderator, and within a couple of days 8 more questions had been added. At the time of the Open Forum, 5 more questions were added, and 3 more after that. Below is a presentation of a snapshot of the Urtak Poll results taken on December 10, 2011.

Polls such as this are not scientific – they are not based upon random sampling – and 95% of the people who participated in the poll think the school should remain tuition free. Two major impediments to an analysis of the poll are that it doesn't separate alumni responses (72%) from student responses (25%), and it doesn't separate those who took the poll prior to the Open Forum from those who took it after. It would appear that about 50 out of 189 people participated in the poll after.

In polls, it is always important to pay attention to exactly how the question is worded. The order that questions are asked can also effect the answers – this is known as self-herding behavior. On Urtak, you can perform your own analysis, sorting the results by the oldest or newest, the number of responses (which, of course, correlates to the oldest or newest), the most agreed upon and most divided, and something Urtak calls the most cared about and least cared about. A problem with Urtak is you must actually click on each answer to see the results and to see information about how many people were polled and when the question was posted. Also, the results are not sorted by subject.
